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

Obituaries

Frank A. Bond, FPSA, Hon.NEC, 90, a life vice-president of the New England Camera Club Council of Buxton, Maine and formerly of Saugus, Massachusetts, left us on July 21, 2007. Frank served in the US Army Air Corps as a combat photographer in India and Burma during WWII. Photography was a lifelong passion for him.



He did photography for the Saugus Advertiser, the Saugus Police Department and operated Bond Photo Studio for over 50 years, all while raising a family and working at General Electric as a manager. On the hobby side he was a member and held officer positions in several organizations.

For his fine photography and organizational work, Frank was named a "Fellow" of the Photographic Society of America and life vice-president of the New England Camera Club Council. A council officer for over 45 years, Frank held the office of Secretary/Treasurer from 1962-1964 and was NECCC President from 1964-1966. He was a great asset to the council with his vast knowledge of past council activities.

At the Greater Lynn Photographic Association he was the first person to be made an Honorary Life Member and was a past president and long serving treasurer.

Frank was a well-respected judge who traveled to many clubs in New England to share his knowledge, especially in prints. He remains in many of our memories with his L-Shaped cropping aids in hand, while speaking to the audience of proper print cropping. He lived in Buxton, Maine with his daughter and son-in-law for the last few years due to health considerations but his heart remained on Boston's North shore. His wife Doris survives him.

In Memoriam

F. Austen Newhall, one of the founding members of the Springfield Photographic Society, passed away on September 5, 2007. Austen joined the club in the 1930's and for years he was very active serving as President in 1971-1972 and 1972-1973. His portraits were striking and he won numerous awards with his images. He was also very active with the New England Camera Club Council serving on the model/pageant committee for many years. He is survived by his wife of 63 years, Phyllis.

Conference Dedication 2007

It is with gratitude and great pride that the New England Camera Club Council dedicated the 2007 Annual Conference to Susan and Jacob Mosser, FPSA's, HonNEC's.

The annual Conference of the New England Camera Club Council enjoys the envious status of the best of its kind in the United States and Canada. This notable reputation could not have been achieved and sustained without the coordinated efforts and dedication of our Council members, presenters and-committee workers. Two individuals who are well known in photographic circles are especially synonymous with NECCC Conferences, namely Jacob Mosser III, FPSA, HonNEC and Susan C. Mosser, FPSA, HonNEC. In recognition of their numerous contributions to photography and especially to the New England Camera Club Council, we proudly dedicate the 2007 Conference to these two extraordinary people.

Susan Mosser was elected to the Council in July of 1987. She was given a "baptism of fire" and named Program Chairman for the 1988 Conference. Over the years she has been involved in chairing six Conferences, three times singly, and three times as co-chairman. In addition she has served as Council President in 2000 and 2001, as Hi-Jinx chairman and as chairman of Conference Slide competitions. Since 1992 she has been Equipment Coordinator, a responsibility that she carries out simultaneously with other numerous Council activities. Susan is the person who knows how to get things done and therefore has been a mentor and an inspirational source to many Conference chairpersons and committee workers. Susan was made an Honorary Member of the New England Camera Club Council (HonNEC) in 1998.

Jacob Mosser formally joined the Council in 2003, but has been associated with NECCC for many years as a Conference speaker, as a Hi-Jinx model and has worked behind the scenes on just about every aspect of the Conference. His first Conference presentation in 1980 was a program on pet photography. While in Jake's words it was "a pale version of things to come", he has since then presented 15 instructional and inspirational programs on a variety of subjects. He continues to be one of

the most popular Conference speakers. Jacob also contributes to the Recorded Lectures library which is a Council service to member clubs. In addition he has been a commentator to both the Nature and Pictorial slide circuits. Jacob was also awarded the title of Honorary Member of the New England Camera Club Council (HonNEC) in 1998.

Jacob joined the Greater Lynn Photographic Association (formerly the Greater Lynn Camera Club) in the mid 1970s and immediately became passionate about serious photography. Susan joined Greater Lynn in 1977 and since she did not photograph at that time, she took on organizational projects. She assumed the chairmanship of the Greater Lynn International and has directed the world's largest color salon for 28 years. Jacob and Susan have both served as presidents of GLPA and were recently named Honorary Life Vic-Presidents. They were the prime motivators in the successful drive for GLPA to purchase its own building.

Other organizations have also benefited from endless energy of the Mossers. Susan has been program chairman of Yankee Photographic Society for about 20 years and has served as program chairman for several Photographic Society of America conferences. She has also served on PSA Honors and Nominating committees. Jacob has devoted six years to to PSA's Nature Division as an officer and chairman and has also served on the Uniform Standards committee. He has lectured throughout the US and Canada where both Mossers are popular PSA salon judges. Susan started photographing in the late 1980s and both she and Jacob are multi star exhibitors in PSA salons and have received numerous photographic awards. In recognition of their services and achievements, Jacob and Susan have both been elected fellows of the Photographic Society of America (FPSA), Jacob in 1992 and Susan in 1993.

Jacob and Susan are active members of Massachusetts Camera Naturalists (CamNats), an invitational organization dedicated to the art and teaching of natural history photography. Jacob is a past Chairman of CamNats. Jacob has been nominated as incoming President of NECCC and Susan will be Co-Chairman of the 2008 Conference. Meanwhile they live in North Reading, Massachusetts with their cats, trusty old film cameras and a Harley-Davidson motorcycle. 📷

As is usual in a competition where the prints submitted were already winners during the season, the judges had to make some really tough decisions. After careful examination and evaluation of the final choices, and a very lively round of discussion, awarded Print of the Year in each category were:

2007 Annual Conference Print Competitions

The annual B&W and Color print competitions were held at the 62nd NECCC Conference in Amherst on Saturday, July 14, 2007. A total of 161 color and 99 black & white prints were entered. Although the total number of prints (260) was down significantly from last year's total of just over 500, this year marked a change in the number of prints a maker could submit.

Going to one color and one black & white print from each maker, plus having the Inter-club Print of the Year competition held before the conference, the print chairman's estimate of the number of prints that might be expected for this conference was 250. Exceeding this number indicates that the Conference print program is very much "alive and well". Having a somewhat diminished print total resulted in one hour less time being needed to run the competition.

Judges for the competition were Lin Craft, APSA, FS-CACC, a highly accomplished nature photographer, holding a master's degree and doctorate in marine biology, Raymond Guillette, MNEC, past president of the Stony Brook Camera Club and a Vice President on the NECCC board, and Lynn Thompson, past treasurer of the Techniques Division and Color Slide Division of PSA, presently serving on the PSA board of directors as PSA treasurer. Although the quantity of prints submitted was more manageable than in previous conference competitions, the judge's task was still formidable, taking just a bit more than three hours to complete. Thank you all for a job well done!!!

Editor's Notes - Motivate Yourself

There comes a time when many photographers, along with other creative artists, will suffer from burnout in their approach to creating new work. I recently attended a discussion group of painters and photographers who were discussing this problem. As photographers, the idea can get rooted in the mind that there is nothing more to photograph, and we lose our incentive to go out and create new images.

What we must do is to motivate ourselves to go and take different images of our previous successes and to interpret them in a new light. Perhaps a different time of day will be all it takes to create a new image or a different viewpoint. Why not use a different lens? Maybe borrow or rent an ultra wide or extreme telephoto lens to put a new perspective on the image. Try zooming the lens during a long exposure in your night photography.

If you are a film shooter then perhaps giving a new film a try may just do the trick by using a higher or lower contrast emulsion. For the digital shooter, try experimenting with the various ISO settings to alter the captured image where a higher ISO can result in more noise in the image. The best way is to go out and experiment and to try new ways of getting those images. If you normally shoot in color then give black & white and you might surprise yourself with what you can create.

Perhaps you have avoided photographing well imaged scenes by other photographers because you felt that it had already been overdone. You could certainly choose a different time of day, a different season of the year, or photographing the scene during inclement weather. Imagine what a gentle misting rain could do for a photograph or light falling snow. There are lots of possibilities to explore.

Another possibility is to set yourself a task such as documenting your neighborhood or look for photographs in doorways or gates. What is most important is for you to dust off those cameras, load them with memory cards or film, and do something with your photography. All this can help to stimulate your creative urge and to get out there and be happy with your photography. Try it, you'll like it! 📷

Hunting In The Forest

by Ray Guillette

Photography in the forest can be very rewarding. It's a great place to lose yourself in the creative process. But the forest landscape presents some challenges. As always, light is the first element to consider. Diffuse, non-directional light will allow the complex graphics found in trees and branches to be best appreciated. Bright, directional sunlight creates a "forest" of highlights and confusing shapes in a wooded landscape. Cloudy-day light will simplify the composition and minimize highlights. It will also bring out details that would otherwise be hidden in shadows. Remember that leaves and pine needles are great reflectors of even diffuse, cloudy light. A polarizer will minimize these reflections, and enhance color saturation. Careful framing can eliminate most of the cloudy sky, and focus attention more toward the ground.

In bright sunlight, try backlighting to emphasize shape and add drama to the image. Early or late light gives the opportunity to use a small lens opening and make a sunstar with the sun partially hidden behind a tree. If you are blessed with a foggy morning or a windy morning after a snowstorm, the backlit sun will interact with the fog or the snow being blown off of treetops to enhance the sunstar effect.

Viewpoint is critical in forest photography. Try to find a camera position that will make a composition with contrasts of size and shape. Try to show depth, width, and scale in this large, complicated space. An interesting tree or other foreground element might help this effort. Look very carefully before and after selecting a viewpoint. Use your viewfinder to see possible distractions resulting from the type of lens you have chosen.

A wide angle lens pointed up will make trees converge and look unnatural. A higher camera position and a medium focal length will minimize the convergence and make the trees more parallel. I carry a light stepladder, allowing me to raise my tripod to its maximum height. Telephoto lenses will compress trees and depth, giving an abstract element to the composition.

My favorite position in a tall forest is flat on my back, looking upward with my widest lens. Here the intentional and maximized convergence of treetops is captivating and purposefully unnatural. Watching the slow sway of treetops is hypnotic in a forest quiet but for the swish of leaves and the creak of tall trunks. Don't miss this opportunity. Forests also show the change of seasons; the buds and new green of spring, the lush summer foliage, the warm fall colors, and the snow-covered silent beauty of winter. 📷





THE DIGITAL NOTEBOOK: Adobe Bridge (1.3)

As discussed in the last column, there are significant advantages to shooting in RAW format, especially so for nature photographers. Before they can be optimized, RAW files must be converted to a format which can be read by Photoshop. This issue is compounded because every camera manufacturer has its own proprietary RAW format. Prior to Photoshop CS, one had to use software provided by the camera manufacturers to accomplish this necessary conversion.

During the time of Photoshop 7, Adobe added a so called 'raw processor' plug-in which was designed to work with RAW files coming from any digital camera. Being the 800 lb. gorilla of image processing, Adobe was able to get cooperation from the camera manufacturers, who reluctantly shared information on their proprietary RAW formats with Adobe. An improved version of the plug-in was incorporated into the 'RAW processor' which came as a part of Photoshop CS.

Adobe Bridge

Now in CS 2 and CS3, the RAW processor has morphed into 'Bridge' is a much more feature-rich, stand alone program which operates independent of Photoshop. The advantage is that Bridge can be doing its work at the same time you're multiprocessing in Photoshop.

Bridge can be setup with a variety of different views, or 'workspaces' as the program calls them. Figure 4.1 is the default workspace. At the top left is a dropdown box which allows one to navigate to a particular folder of RAW files. On the left hand side of the main panel are three smaller panels, one for 'Favorites', a 'Preview' and the lowermost for 'Metadata' and 'Keywords'. The largest portion of the main panel is reserved for thumbnails. As one moves a mouse along the borders between these panels, the cursor changes into a double-headed arrow which allows one to resize each panel to a preferred size. A slider at the lower right lets one resize thumbnails. Several alternative workspaces can be selected either by using the Window: Workspace command or by clicking on the icons at the lower left of the main panel... see detail in Figure 4.2. Preferred workspaces can be saved by using the Windows: Workspace>Save command.

Figure 4.3 shows a preferred setup for doing an initial review of images. This workspace features a large preview so one can confirm sharpness, and a filmstrip of thumbnails along the bottom of the main panel. The information included with each thumbnail can be 'user defined' via the command Edit: Preferences> General.

In this case the primary objective is to use Bridge to select thumbnails and open them in the Adobe RAW processor.

To select just one thumbnail, simply click on that thumbnail. To select more than one thumbnail, select the first, then <Ctrl><Click> to select additional. To open it in the RAW processor, double click on any of the selected thumbnails.

Camera manufacturers continue to supply proprietary software with their cameras. They claim their knowledge of their systems allows them to get more out of their RAW files than is possible using Adobe Bridge. By and large, there is almost no support for this claim. On the other hand, the command set Adobe used in Bridge is almost identical to that used in Photoshop. That means that a Photoshop user can be up and running in Bridge immediately, a substantial advantage.

There is much more to Bridge, but this will get one started. For a much more complete discussion, take a look at Bruce Fraser's excellent Camera Raw with Adobe Photoshop CS2, ISBN 0321334094.


In the next column I'll take a look at how to use the RAW processor in Bridge to recover shadow and highlight detail and to convert the RAW file to Photoshop format.

32nd Greater Lynn International Exhibition

The closing date for the 32nd Greater Lynn International Exhibition will be February 16, 2008. This is one week earlier than the judging and 4 days sooner than our normal closing date. I will accept entries after that date particularly in slides, but we found last year we needed more time to process the digital entries and prepare them for the judging. It would certainly make life easier for the committee if you tried to get your entry in by February 16th.



Last year's exhibition was another great success. Adding digital gave us a new look in the shows and brought in new people who had never entered before. Along with our other entries from around the world and the USA we had over 225 New England entrants. Internationals such as ours are a lot of fun to do and a great learning experience. It gives you a place to submit and exhibit your work and see how it fares against other material from around the world. Then, if accepted, it is included and featured in one of the best show-cases of the year.

We will continue to be a dual projection exhibition in 2008. What this means is that you can pick the media that you want to submit your work in: either slides or digital images. Please note that you may only enter one form or the other, and your whole entry must be either all slides or all digital. You can't mix and match. The one change we are making for 2008 is that the CD's you submit with your digital entries on them will not be returned. They will be destroyed after the judging. This is to save money and the cost of postage. I tried to keep the fees down this year but due to the new postage increase I had to go up one dollar for the individual entries. The USA club entry fees have not changed and remain at \$5 per maker. You cannot find any other International with fees this low.

The images will be judged just like in past years and will be competing against each other for acceptances and medals. In other words, we will not be having 2 sections with separate winners, but one section only (open subject matter) with slides/digital images. It will be your decision what media you wish to enter in. Club entries may also come in mixed media but still have to arrive in the same package with the correct forms filled out.

Our judges for 2008 will be Kent Crossley, MNEC of the Photographic Society of Rhode Island, Peter Selig, MNEC


of the Cape Cod View Finders, and Alexander Visser, EFI-AP, EPSA of the Greater Lynn Photographic Association. The judging will take place on Friday, February 22, 2008 at 7:30 PM and Saturday, February 23, 2008 at 8:30 AM until we finish (usually about 5:00 PM). As usual a lunch will be provided on Saturday for \$5.00 per person. Judging is open to the public and takes place at the Greater Lynn headquarters at 564 Boston St., Lynn, Massachusetts.

Over 34 medals will be awarded to the highest scoring slides. We will again award the "Best Club Medal" for an entry of 7 or more members received in the same package achieving the highest total score. Get your club together and try to win this medal. We received 24 club entries last year with 13 local New England clubs. Top honors went to The Photographic Society of Rhode Island with Stony Brook Camera Club taking 2nd place and Merrimack Valley finishing in 3rd. The club medal for the largest participation went to Merrimack Valley Camera Club with an unheard 41 entrants. If your club finishes in the top 3 your individual names are listed on a special page in the catalogue, with a great medal for your trophy case. All clubs that participate are also listed on the club page. There is also a reduced entry fee available for club entries that are mailed in the same package. This exhibition continues to be a "tradition" in New England with one club vying against another for the best club entry and largest number of participants. We have some really good photographers here in New England and the club scores and positions reflect that. Get your club involved in the largest International Exhibition in the world.

We will be mailing our individual entry forms out to past entrants and will also be doing a club mailing to NECCC clubs around the 2nd week in October. If you don't receive your entry form and would like to participate, please email me, or write to me for an entry. Enter the Exhibition, and then come to see your slides in the show among the world's best or get your club known by entering and winning the Best Club Entry.

The exhibition will be presented at the Greater Lynn Photographic Association headquarters on Monday and Tuesday, April 7 and 8, 2008 and Yankee Potpourri of Photography on Saturday, April 12, 2008 at Danvers High School, Danvers, Massachusetts. Our exhibition presenters last year Barbara Rozavsky, MNEC (slides) and Dan Charbonnet, FPSA, MNEC (digital) did a fantastic job and we know this year's show will be just as great to see.

Fluid Mask 3 – The Right Tool For Masking and Cut Outs

If you have ever wanted to tear your hair out trying to cut hair out from an image then Fluid Mask 3 is your savior.

VERTUS Tech Fluid Mask 3 is viewed as a professionals' choice in still image cutting. It comes as a stand-alone version as well as a plug-in for Adobe's Photoshop (CS2/CS3) and Elements. It works on Mac (OS.10.3+) and Windows (XP and Vista).

With Fluid Mask 3 you can make incredible mask selections using new sampling and selecting tools. A new complex hair blending algorithm that automatically gets great results even from multi-colored wisps of hair or fur.

The software has a new Patch technology with its intuitive tool-set for working on those difficult problem areas with compression artifacts, poor edges and complex backgrounds. There are a slew of new features such as selecting areas for local detailed edge finding and blending that make masking challenges simple to overcome.

Where Fluid Mask 3 excels is in the creation of cut-outs when the object you're trying to cut out has hair or trees and leaves that have details that interfere with the background like skies and clouds.

I have used two products in the past, one an earlier version of Fluid Mask and the other MaskPro from onOne Software and realize a vast improvement in this product with the introduction of Version 3. Improvements not only in accuracy but in time too. It now takes less than half the time to create an accurate cutout as compared to all the selection capabilities and new tools in Photoshop CS3

Photoshop Plug-in or Stand-alone

Even though Fluid Mask 3 comes in two flavors: a Photoshop plug-in and a stand-alone version, my preference is to use the plug-in version as it has no file limitations and works with 16 bit images (the prior version worked only in 8 bit mode).

The user interface is well laid out and for simple images a simple command like the Auto-Fill Image allows you the sit back and watch Fluid Mask generate a near-perfect cut-out.

Fluid Mask's algorithms use image contrast and color differences; similar to the way our eyes see as a basis to determine the edges. Where the software detects adequate contrast between two color areas, the application concludes that it has found an edge. It is these edges that are treated as boundaries for applying a cut-out. This works great except in those images where the contrast becomes too low, particularly where colors of close proximity at the edge make it

difficult even for our eyes to differentiate. In these situations a bit of tweaking is necessary. You will have to set the edge detection system to different levels of intelligence, and in most cases you will need to isolate the difficult part of the image, so Fluid Mask can more easily detect the differences in contrast, hue, and luminance between the areas you're trying to differentiate from each other.

To help the user Fluid Mask 3 has a number of tools. Of significance is the patch tool that allows you to isolate an area and apply different "recognition" settings to that isolated area. The "Patch" tool allows you to make changes affecting a selected localized region without affecting the rest of the image.

"Patches" can be easily selected with a highlighting brush tool rather than relying on a standard box shaped patch. Once a "Patch" has been selected, you can call up the most popular editing options with a simple right click of the mouse.

This Patch tool works in conjunction with the Color Workspace tool that enables you to isolate colors and designate these as good, bad, or undecided.

You use the Color Workspace on an image to sample the colors that you define as the keep colors or that will now belong to the Keep Mask. Fluid Mask provides color and visual aids to help you further identify the keep areas from the reject areas

The "Color Workspace" palette includes a "Color Sampler" which enables you to select specific colors from an image and see where else within that image the same color appears. Additionally, in the "Color Workspace", a 2-D color map enables more accurate color selection

Localized "Edge Detection" tools enable the automatic detection of hard to find edges within a Patch. In the same way, localized edge blending techniques are used in Patches to overcome common problems such as masking hair and complex colored foregrounds and backgrounds

Fluid Mask 3 works with tablets like the Wacom and provides a pressure sensitivity control to regulate brush size.

VERTUS has provided a few good tutorials that will help you get started and the software has a well structured help file. Additionally, Fluid Mask 3 comes with context-based help system accessible on the lower right of the user interface.

Glennie Competition Date Announced


The Merrimack Valley Camera Club (MVCC) will host and conduct the next annual George W. Glennie Nature Salon on Wednesday, March 26, 2008 at the Trinitarian Congregational Church, Elm Street, North Andover, MA. This salon is open to all member organizations of NECCC.

MVCC President and Chairman of the 2008 salon, Charlie Burke, announced that the competition will continue using only digital images. He expressed the thought that the digital format would provide more organizations with a greater opportunity to participate in this showcase event of nature photography. Last year conversion to digital images resulted in a 25% increase in the number of clubs participating. Burke said that he is hopeful that more organizations give serious consideration to participating in this premier club event. Further, any organization wishing assistance in preparing their submissions should feel free to contact him.

Each participating organization may submit 10 images with no more than 2 by each maker. In the inadvertent event that images are submitted by 2 or more clubs by the same maker, the earliest entries will qualify for individual and club awards. The other entries will be judged but are ineligible for any awards, club or individual. Also ineligible are all slides that have received awards in previous Glennie salons. There will be Club Awards for those receiving the 3 highest scores. Individual awards include Best of Show, Best Animal, Best Bird, Best Botany, Best General Subject, Best Insect or Arachnid, and Best Landscape. Additional categories may be opened, dependent upon entry levels. Honor Awards will be presented and will be based on the level of submissions in each category.

Each digital image may have a maximum width of 1024 pixels and a maximum height of 768 pixels. The image must be submitted in JPEG (.jpg) format and the size is limited to no more than 500 KB. Images may be submitted either by Internet E-Mail or on a CD. On-line registration will be available. Further information concerning entry fees, entry forms and mailing addresses will be provided at a later date.

The following is a statement of the basic guideline concerning Nature digital images: No elements may be moved, cloned, added, deleted, rearranged, combined or changed in any way that affects the integrity of the image content. No manipulation or modification is permitted except resizing, cropping, selective lightening or darkening, restoration of the original color of the scene. No special effects filters can be added or applied, and any sharpening must appear natural.

Camera Care

Yes, it is true that sales of film cameras are declining while digital models are rising. However, film models are still quite popular and if you have high quality additional lenses it makes good sense to keep using your film camera instead of starting all over with equipment you are not familiar with.. The pleasure in using a film model comes mostly from the TAKING, not the Making of a beautiful scene! Your creative part of the brain has to function as you “click” the shutter to record a prizewinner!

There are similar minor problems with whatever model chosen. Film bodies tend to exhibit more screws at various locations that require frequent checking or replacing. The constant loading-unloading of film introduces various bits of foreign material that should be brushed or blown out between each loading of film, otherwise white dust spots could appear on prints or be black specks on slides.

Single lens reflex digital cameras are also vulnerable to tiny dust-dirt particles that become “electronically charged” and are pulled right inside the opening created when you remove the lens! These particles now can deposit themselves on the sensor plate and will show up as odd shapes on a print. You cannot see these specks in your viewfinder! They must be carefully cleaned off the sensor, a job that had best be done by a trained service technician.

Our Nikon lens test shown here is typical of many high-grade models made for film cameras and duplicated to fit the digital bodies. As the test shows, perfect optical alignment of the separate lens elements does make a difference!
